Senatorial Candidates Invited To Speak



Wednesday September 20: General Membership Meeting at Old Pine Church 7:00 PM



Congressman Klink

Republican Senator Rick Santorum and Democratic Congressman Ron Klink have been invited to speak before the Society Hill Civic Association's (SHCA's) September 20th General Membership Meeting. Our civic association welcomes the Old City Civic Association as its co-sponsor for this important and timely meeting. At press time, Congressman Klink has accepted, while a final answer has not yet been received from Senator Santorum's of-

Congressman Klink will speak about the issues he faces in his contest for Santorum's Pennsylvania Senatorial seat, and he will take questions from the floor. The U.S. Senate presently consists of 46 Democrats and 54 Republicans. There is a strong possibility that three or more Supreme Court appointments will be made in the near future, requiring the advice and consent of the Senate. With one-third of the Senate seats to be filled, this is a significant election.

About Congressman Klink

From Western Pennsylvania's 4th District and now in his fourth term in Congress, Ron Klink was once a Pittsburgh KDKA television anchorman. He and his wife Linda Hogan have been married for 22 years. They live in the Pittsburgh suburb of Murrysville with their two children: Matthew, 14 and Juliana, 12.

Congressman Klink serves on the House Commerce Committee. His primary concerns are job creation and keeping Pennsylvania competitive in the rapidly changing global economy. He has voted to protect Medicare, Social Security and education. Klink's preferred use of the nation's budget surplus is to preserve Social Security, include prescription medicines as part of Medicare and promote educational programs such as Head Start.

About Senator Santorum

Senator Santorum joined the United States Senate in 1995. He was recently named Senate Co-Chair of the Senate Majority Leader's Task Force on Social Security and also became the Senate Chairman of the Renewal Alliance—a group of House members and Senators whose goal is to encourage citizens to become more involved in their local communities. Senator Santorum's committee assignments for the 106th Congress include the Senate Armed Services Committee, where he chairs the Subcommittee on AirLand Forces, the Banking Committee and the Senate Agriculture Committee. He is also a member of the Rules Committee and the Senate Select Committee on Aging.

About Old Pine Street Church

The only colonial Presbyterian church in Philadelphia still standing and in continuous use, Old Pine was formally named "Third, Scots and Mariners Presbyterian Church."

Constructed in 1768 its first minister, Francis Alison, founded the University of Delaware and the nation's first insurance company, The Presbyterian Ministers' Fund. Pastor George Duffield, an ardent revolutionary, led his congregation to the cause of independence, earning Old Pine the name of "Church of the Patriots." Declaration of Independence signers John Adams and Dr. Benjamin Rush worshipped at Old Pine.

During the Revolutionary War, the British used the church as a hospital. The pews and pulpit were burned to provide heat for the sick and dying British soldiers. Hessian mercenaries were buried in a common trench outside the church wall. In the 1860s, the building was remodeled in the Greek Revival style. More than 30 historic cultural institutions, museums, organizations, and houses of worship within the district are promoted, such as Carpenters' Hall, The Athenaeum, the Physick House, and of course, Independence Park.

Filmmaker Marianne Connor produced this video in cooperation with Philadelphia's Historic Neighborhood Consortium.

President's Message



Fall is approaching, but the term is a misnomer. The word denotes approaching an end, but in reality it is the beginning of a new season of activities. Over the summer, your SHCA Board and various committees have been very active. As neighbors, we are fortunate for the high level of commitment reflected in the committees that serve us. These committees make SHCA's officers look good, but more importantly, they play an important

role in the quality of life for all of Society Hill.

In this column I will update you on two current SHCA major initiatives, as well as inform you about other efforts we're involved in.

Neighborhood Improvement District

Under the able leadership of Board Director Mark Keener, AIA, of the Southwest Quadrant, we have created a broad-based committee to study whether we wish to form a Neighborhood Improvement District for Society Hill.

A Neighborhood Improvement District is a local municipal authority, similar to the Center City District and the University City District. Recent state legislation provides for residential neighborhoods to create a Neighborhood Improvement District.

Our civic association will be holding community meetings to both report the work of our Neighborhood Improvement District Study Committee and to receive your input. I urge your participation at these important meetings. We'll keep you informed as to time and place.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

SHCA is coordinating the efforts of a coalition of community organizations calling on Congress to enact legislation that would provide a permanent Honorary Military Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Revolutionary War Soldier at Washington Square. The only other site where this honor is bestowed is Arlington National Cemetery.

To date, there are over ten prominent regional organizations that have joined the coalition at our request—among them are the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, the American Patriots Trust Fund, the Friends of Independence National Historical Park and Historic Philadelphia, Inc.

We are seeking broad-based, bipartisan Congressional support for this initiative, and will be inviting both the Gore/Lieberman and Bush/Cheney teams to visit Washington Square during the presidential campaign. Senator Arlen Specter (R, PA) and Representative William Brady (D, PA) are introducing legislation in their respective bodies of Congress to support this initiative.

While we expect no opposition to this bill, getting legislation through Congress requires skilled, professional guidance. Therefore, we are seeking funds that would allow our coalition to retain a public relations firm and a DC lobbyist to ensure that the legislation is passed.

Update: Washington Square Improvements Project

A grant for \$482,000 was recently received from the Economic Development Administration (EDA) for additional improvements to Washington Square. Restoration of the interior and exterior walkways, lighting, drainage, site furnishing and the Square's exterior wall has already been completed.

The EDA grant will be used to complete the following improvements, among others: landscape restoration; restoration of the monument; replacement of the eternal flame; and restoration of the fountain. In addition, the American Revolution Patriots Fund is providing funds for the installation of an irrigation sys-

We have been working with several key people, such as Winn Carroll of the American Revolution Patriots and our neighbors Bill Hawkins and George Koch, to try to accelerate the Square's completion of capital improvements under the supervision of the Fairmount Park Commission and overseen by the National Park Service. Virtually all of the funding for those improvements is in place.

Finally, our thanks to Councilman Frank DiCicco, Executive Director Bill Mifflin of the Fairmount Park Commission and Police Captain Brian Korn for meeting with us on June 13th, at our request.

We met, together with community leaders and neighbors of Washington Square, to discuss concerns about the status of the Square's improvements and ongoing maintenance of grass cutting, landscaping, trash collection, and safety.

By virtue of the commitments and action of these public officials to our concerns, Washington Square is now cleaner, better maintained and safer. Since then, signs have been posted to inform people of the remaining upcoming improvements which are expected to be completed next year, prior to Washington Square becoming a part of Independence National Historical Park.

Independence Charter School Gets Approval

On July 19, 2000, Pennsylvania's Charter Appeal Board unanimously approved a charter for the Independence Charter School (ICS). ICS, scheduled to open in September 2001, is a community-based elementary school that will emphasize world cultures and languages.

Alternative public education options

This school is the brainchild of local parents, including several from Society Hill. Their intention is to provide alternative public education options for parents, particularly those in Center City who frequently move out of Philadelphia when their children reach school age.

ICS may serve to keep more families in Philadelphia and Society Hill, thereby stabilizing the community and even increasing property values. The school will be located near Society Hill or within easy access of the community.

Spanish will be taught to all ICS students beginning in kindergarten, with an optional immersion program in one kindergarten class for those desiring an intense language experience. In the future, additional languages will be added to the curriculum.

Museums, historical buildings, cultural institutions tie into programs

ICS also plans to partner with some of Philadelphia's civic and historical organizations to develop curricula incorporating the ICS may serve to keep more families in Philadelphia and Society Hill, thereby stabilizing the community and even increasing property values. The school will be located near Society Hill or within easy access of the community.



Philips Court – New Homes Between 2nd and 3rd on Lombard

The initial six homes range in size from 2,600 to 3,600 square feet. All initial homes were sold prior to construction.


Philips Court is a 45-unit town home development being constructed on the largest remaining residential zoned parcel in the Society Hill area. The initial six homes range in size from 2,600 to 3,600 square feet. All initial homes were sold prior to construction.

The street facades of the homes are brick to compliment the Head House Square architecture. Interior features include hardwood floors, fireplaces and brick patios. Outdoor features include roof decks and one or two garages. (Garages, unfortunately, are at street level at the front of the homes, rather than underground.)

When completed, Philips Court will consist of 45 units priced from \$475,000 (3 bedrooms, 2.5 baths, single-car garage) to \$675,000 (4 bedrooms, 2.5 baths, 2-car garage). Buyers can also combine lots into a top-of-the-line unit for \$950,000.

Philips Court is scheduled to take approximately three years to complete. It is being developed by the MK Lombard Group I, LLC.

Deborah McKinley



Asked who or what persuaded her to become a Presbyterian minister 18 years ago, Deborah McKinley, pastor at Old Pine Street Church, answers without hesitation or elaboration in one word: "God."

At the University of California at San Diego, she felt, she says, "a strong sense of calling" and heeded it by enrolling in the seminary at Princeton. After nine years at her first ministry in Harrisburg, and a further four in

administration at the Presbyterian General Assembly office in Louisville, Kentucky, she came to Old Pine five years ago.

To the other predictable question — the one about what it's like to be a woman in a traditionally — and overwhelmingly — male occupation, Deborah is equally unequivocal: Whether a woman could or should be an ordained minister was never an issue for her, she says, and her present congregation of some 200 souls is very accepting.

A convert from Catholicism, she believes that Presbyterianism offers a "big tent" for both theological conservatives and liberals; moreover, she claims, it tends toward a collective rather than an ex cathedra leadership.

Even so, Old Pine Street Church has a pretty aristocratic and colorful heritage. Built in 1766-68, it numbered two signers of the Declaration of Independence among its congregants — John Adams and Dr. Benjamin Rush. In the mid 19th century the church was transformed from a Georgian structure to its present

elegant Greek Revival style. When British troops occupied Philadelphia, they confiscated the church for use as a war hospital building, and the surrounding graveyard contains the remains of many bygone military, ecclesiastical and political luminaries.

The Church fell on hard times when Society Hill found itself in the lowest socioeconomic stratum in Philadelphia, but recouped its former status when the area "regentrified" itself in the 1960s.

Together with her counterparts from other religious denominations, Deborah McKinley meets monthly as part of an ecumenical grouping called The Old Philadelphia Congregations. Nowhere else in Colonial America, she says, do you find such a diversity of religious houses — a tribute to William Penn's commitment to religious freedom. The group organizes walking tours to all these historic places of worship.

Deborah and her husband Dave Rich, a retired Presbyterian minister, are enthusiastic walkers in a less transcendental mode, having hiked many trails, including some in Switzerland last summer. And, they agree, just walking around Society Hill is endlessly rewarding and instructive.

Dave has two children in their 30s from a previous marriage, and spent eight years at the Presbyterian Church's board of pensions, as well as serving in a campus ministry and conducting lifework workshops. They live on the 400 block of Pine Street in the traditional Church "manse" that is owned by Old Pine.

Old Pine Street Church is an historic and architectural Philadelphia landmark; it is also distinctly in tune with the times in its embrace of ecumenicism and diversity.

Philadelphia Trash Rules for Society Hill

Professor Curby Bucket wants to help you obey the rules. Here is a quick refresher course from the trash teacher. Let's help the environment while showing our Society Hill pride by following the trash rules!

- Household trash does not go into the corner receptacles
 The city removes receptacles where this is a problem.
- 2. Trash may not be put out until 4:00 p.m. on Mondays.
- Newspapers should either be placed in paper bags, taped or tied with strings. They should not be put in the blue recycle containers.
- 4. Mixed paper: mail, cereal type boxes (without wax paper) catalogs, telephone books, office paper, magazines, etc. should be placed in paper bags, taped or tied. They should not be put in the blue recycle containers.
- 5. Blue recycle containers are available at 7th and Pattison.
- 6. All glass containers should be rinsed out and placed in the blue recycle container without their lids.
- 7. Metal food and beverage cans should be rinsed out and placed in the blue recycle container.
- 8. Aerosol cans should be placed in the blue recycle container without their lids.
- Paint cans should be air-dried and put curbside with their lids removed.
- 10. The city does not recycle plastic.
- Regular trash and recyclable trash should both be put out at the same time.

Message From Your Editors: Register NOW

We are reminding all citizens of Society Hill who are not registered to vote to take the time to register NOW. We are all so fortunate to be living here, in this great country and in our historically unique city.

Almost three hundred years ago (in 1701) William Penn, in his Charter of Privileges, defied established practice by creating a community welcoming everyone, regardless of religious preference or national origin. Later, in 1787 and also in this city, the U.S. Constitution was drafted to guarantee all citizens the freedom to practice the religion of their choice.

Here in our own little corner of the world, which William Penn created, our Civic Association has been welcomed into most houses of worship for General Membership Meetings — exemplifying our community's as well as the country's tradition of diversity and religious freedom. On September 20th, we'll be conducting our General Membership Meeting at Old Pine Church, a colonial-era Presbyterian church, built in 1768.

Another major freedom, guaranteed under our Constitution, gives each citizen the right to vote. Don't waste this opportunity. Pro and Con Restaurant Review: Authentic Asian Fish Grill, 507 South 6th Street

The magical fish swimming through sea grasses barely submerges the original Levis Hot Dog sign. The exotically carved door opens into a black and white tent with an open kitchen in front for cooking the fas-

tidious food. Fanciful sconces alight the small room's carefully selected fabrics and furnishings. This attention to detail is reflected right down to the little ceremony for pouring tea.

On both visits the meals included wonderfully presented appetizers (Fujimon Chicken Roll and Pataya Chicken Salad). The Vegetarian Sesame Lo Mein and the grilled steak got the all important tastebud approval — my own and neighbors dining on each side. A take-out menu is available.

Like any new enterprise, the staff is smoothing out the kinks in service. For instance, suddenly I realized my dress was drenched from a leaking wine bucket, but when a zealous server whisked it away she muttered, "Aye, the trick bucket!" I realized that some things do need to be thrown out. But go for the food and the atmosphere and, when you go, ask for the trick bucket — it will identify you as a local, and something magical will happen.

BYOB, Credit Cards Accepted, Vegetarian Dishes

Con: Old Curmudgeoness

Happy as we were to find a new restaurant within Society Hill's boundaries, I have to report that the rebirth of Levis Hot Dogs as an Asian fusion restaurant does not work. Sadly, it does not provide good food, good service or really good prices. What cuisines are fused is the question, as everything tastes pretty much the same. We visited the restaurant twice — on both visits the daily specials were the same. The soups are the best thing on the menu and the only good values.

Dumplings at \$6 seemed expensive and were tasteless, as were the shrimp and chicken rolls. The same sauces, allegedly from Thailand, Hong Kong and the rest of the Far East, were used on all foods. Desserts are unimaginative and Euro-American. Three appetizers, one vegetarian noodle main course, one indifferent piece of lemon cake and no beverages (we brought our own wine) cost \$37.45 including tax.

During our first meal one of our diners was drenched by a leaking wine bucket. No towels or apologies were offered. Instead the waitperson laughingly said, "Oh, it's the trick bucket!" On the second visit, our utensils from the first course were handed back to us by a different waitperson. He held the fork by its tines and the spoon by the bowl: neither appetizing nor sanitary. The owner is a very nice man, so I hope things improve quickly.


Preservation Manual: The Society Hill Historic District Manual: A Guide for Property Owners


